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settings, has increased over the last decade. Gov. Evers' investment will assist DCF, along with key stakeholders, in implementing a multi-pronged approach to serve more children and youth with complex needs in-state and reduce the likelihood of them having to receive specialized care out of state and away from their communities and support networks. The programming, funded through the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), will focus on enhancing care and outcomes for Wisconsin's most vulnerable children and youth.

"While our goal is to keep children within their home, we know that sometimes other supportive services are needed," said DCF Secretary Amundson. "When this occurs, keeping children and youth connected to their family and community, while receiving specialized care that meets their needs, is key to their success. DCF and our child welfare community appreciate the governor's investment and commitment to keep Wisconsin children and youth within their communities."

Over the coming weeks, DCF will work with partners to assist in the design and implementation of additional supports in group care settings, community-based supports for children in treatment foster care settings, and the development of a statewide electronic referral system for group care providers.
