I've always said much of the hard work that happens in our state happens at the local level, whether it's expanding affordable housing, repairing streets, ensuring clean parks and water, providing essential services like EMS, police, and fire, or supporting local libraries and public health.

But let's be frank: for the last decade, our local partners have been asked to do more with less.

The bottom line is that the way we've been funding essential local services in our communities is unsustainable, and it's time for the state to do its part.

That's why I'm proposing to send 20 percent of the state's sales tax revenue back to our local communities for shared revenue.
